ST. AUGUSTINE TERRACE AND FOOD PANTRY

Securing Housing and Feeding Our Neighbors

A roof over one's head and food to eat are basic. Morrisania in The Bronx is where Catholic Charities has expanded providing the help of nutritious meals and creating the hope for a better future in a new apartment.

St. Augustine Terrace, on the footprint of the former parish Church, is the first new affordable housing construction of Catholic Homes in three decades. In Spring, 2019, 112 apartments, including 35 studios (designated for mentally-ill adults who are able to live independently) and 77 1, 2, and 3 bedrooms for families, opened. Catholic Charities Community Services Beacon of Hope Division provides supportive services to the studio apartment residents.

St. Augustine is just one of Catholic Charities' broad network of shelters, temporary and permanent affordable housing for New York families and individuals. In partnership with Catholic Homes, Catholic Charities plans to develop over 1500 new apartments in the next decade.

Across the street, twice a week, Catholic Charities operates a client-choice food pantry with the faithful support of 25 parish volunteers. This is one of the more than 40 food pantries and soup kitchens of the Catholic Charities federation providing over 5 million meals each year to hungry New Yorkers.


